Today the Randwick Hospitals' Campus includes four major hospitals; the Prince of Wales Hospital, Royal Hospital for Women, Prince of Wales Private, Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick as well as the Eastern Suburbs Mental Health Service, NeuRA, Black Dog Institute, the Bright Alliance and Ronald McDonald House. It is bordered by Hospital Road, High, Barker and Avoca streets within the main town centre of Randwick.
